



## 10,000 engineering students will be provided AI skill training: CM Chandrababu



In a significant move for the state of Andhra Pradesh, Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu has announced that an agreement has been signed to establish a robust artificial intelligence (AI) system. The announcement was made via a post on social media platform X, where Naidu highlighted the collaboration with Nvidia, led by IT Minister Nara Lokesh. The partnership aims to provide skill training to 10,000 engineering students over the next two years in the town of Madduthu. This initiative is expected to foster the development of 500 AI startups in the state, demonstrating Andhra Pradesh's commitment to building a strong foundation in education, skills, research, and innovation.

## CM Chandrababu Naidu Urges MLAs to Enhance Public Trust in Alliance Government

Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister and Telugu Desam Party (TDP) National President Nara Chandrababu Naidu has called upon all MLAs to step up their efforts and improve their performance. During a teleconference on Saturday with TDP members, leaders, and MLAs at the party office in Amaravati, CM Naidu emphasised the importance of earning and maintaining the trust of the public, reminding them that the citizens are closely observing their actions.

Highlighting an upcoming event, CM Naidu announced plans to organise a gathering of 2,000 people in Amaravati on June 12 to commemorate the one-year anniversary of the NDA government assuming power. He urged that similar programmes be held across Andhra Pradesh, stressing the need to communicate the developmental initiatives



undertaken by the NDA government throughout the year. The Chief Minister expressed his awareness of the performance of individual MLAs and stressed the importance of being accessible to the public. He aimed to inform citizens about the prevailing conditions in Andhra Pradesh under the NDA alliance, particularly as

the state grapples with a significant financial crisis leading up to June 2024. Reflecting on his experience as a four-time Chief Minister, Naidu remarked that he had never encountered such challenging circumstances. Nonetheless, he is focused on improving the state's financial situation while continuing with welfare and development programmes.

He expressed frustration over the disruptive actions of certain individuals, stating that there is a need to take a firm stance against such elements.

Naidu also noted the historical context of issues like drug availability, particularly ganja, asserting that significant progress has been made in controlling these problems. He assured a strong crackdown on lawlessness, drug trafficking, and organised crime in the state.

On a positive note, the Chief Minister mentioned the success of the recent Mahanadu event and confirmed that the establishment of all committees and state bodies would be finalised by next month. He encouraged party members to actively participate in Yoga Day celebrations, promoting the benefits of yoga for their health and well-being.

## Heavy Rain causes disruptions in Hyderabad city

Heavy rain swept through various parts of the city on Saturday afternoon, affecting areas such as Borabanda, Ameerpet, Banjara Hills, and Mehdiapatnam. The downpour led to significant waterlogging on the roads, causing inconvenience for motorists. Many found themselves drenched as they navigated the wet streets, while two-wheeler riders sought shelter under flyovers in certain locations. Traffic congestion was reported in Banjara Hills and Jubilee Hills, with vehicles moving slowly.

## Tata-Dassault fuselage deal will boost manufacturing in general

The signing of four Production Transfer Agreements by Dassault Aviation and Tata Advanced Systems Limited (TASL) to manufacture the Rafale fighter fuselage in India is a big fillip to not just defence production in the country but also manufacturing in general. The French plane-maker rightly said that it marks "a significant step forward in strengthening the country's aerospace manufacturing capabilities and supporting global supply chains." The fuselage of an aircraft is its central body portion, excluding the engines, tail, and wings. It houses the cockpit, avionics, fuel, and payload—essentially serving as the backbone of the aircraft. In the case of Rafale, a multirole fighter jet renowned for its agility, advanced avionics, and combat effectiveness, manufacturing the fuselage involves high-precision engineering, advanced composites, and tight tolerances. Bringing such a sophisticated process to Indian soil reflects the maturity of the country's aerospace manufacturing environment and the trust



global original equipment manufacturers (OEMs) are increasingly placing in Indian firms. In recent years, numerous Indian companies have emerged as key players in the defence manufacturing sector, contributing to the country's vision of self-reliance under the Atmanirbhar Bharat programme. Major public sector undertakings like Hindustan Aeronautics Limited, Bharat Electronics Limited, and Bharat Dynamics Limited have long been at the forefront of producing aircraft, radars, missiles,

and other critical defence systems. Alongside them, private sector giants such as TASL, Larsen & Toubro (L&T), Mahindra Defence Systems, and Bharat Forge have significantly expanded their footprint in defence production. These companies manufacture a wide range of equipment, including artillery systems, armoured vehicles, UAVs (unmanned aerial vehicles), and missile components. Their growing capabilities are further boosted by partner-

ships with global defence firms, enabling technology transfer and joint ventures. This robust participation from both public and private sectors is crucial for reducing import dependence and building a strong, indigenous defence industrial base. The Dassault-TASL partnership is a testament to the vision of the Make in India initiative, which has been pushing for increased localisation in defence procurement. By transferring production capabilities to India, Dassault is enabling Indian companies to climb up the value chain—from low-end assembly to high-end design and production. The collaboration with TASL, a company already experienced in aerospace production, enhances India's ability to build a complex, high-performance defence product and helps cultivate a local ecosystem of skilled workers, advanced suppliers, and engineering talent. Furthermore, this move significantly reduces India's reliance on imports for critical defence hardware, contributing to strategic autonomy. Over the decades, India has been one of the world's largest

arms importers. While importing advanced weapon systems has been necessary to meet immediate defence requirements, long-term sustainability lies in indigenisation. The Rafale fuselage manufacturing agreement is, therefore, more than a business deal—it is a step toward building a sustainable and technologically advanced defence industrial base within India. The economic implications of this development are equally profound. High-technology manufacturing generates employment across the value chain—from technicians and engineers to logistics and quality assurance personnel. The joint venture will not only create direct employment but also foster ancillary industries, leading to the development of an aerospace manufacturing cluster with potential spillover benefits to the civilian aviation sector. The infrastructure and capabilities established through this programme can later be leveraged for commercial aerospace production, such as passenger aircraft components, thereby further integrating India into the global aerospace supply chain.

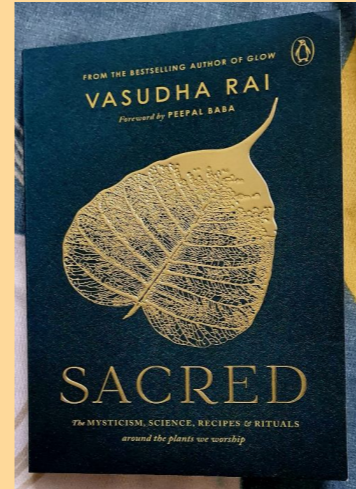
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## SCIENCE AND MYTH ABOUT TREES

### SUNDAY BOOK REVIEW

We know that plants and trees play a crucial role in our ecosystem. They also have a big role in our social and economic spheres. All our Scriptures and holy texts underscore the spiritual role of leaves, flowers, fruits, plants and trees in many of our religious rituals. This is called Divine Botany and author Vasudha Rai in her latest book "Sacred talks about this aspect and reels out stunning and little known secrets about plants and trees and our symbiotic relationship with them.



We human beings foolishly think that these plants, and trees depend on us and they cannot survive without us. But the fact is that we can't live without them and so it is our bounded duty to love them and to take care them.

Rai has done extensive research and gleaned invaluable facts and figures about this Divine Botany and arranged all that information under three sections namely Seek, Surrender, and Sanctify, each one of them has a short and pithy introduction and thumbnail sketches of plants.

In the first part Rai talks about many plants and trees that are closely connected with spiritual rituals in all religions. Rai says that all religions instruct us to see God in everything. Frankincense, Myrrh, Haritaki are the three most popular plant items used almost in all religions including Christianity.

Then she talks about "Woods of Worship, such as Sandalwood, Agarwood, and Halmaddi and one can find references to these resins in the Rig Veda and the epics. The votaries of all major religions use these fragrant resins. When we perform rituals burning incense sticks and spraying perfumes at home or at places of worship, we are seekers of Divinity. Hence the title SEEK.

Later Rai gives out information about the mythological, traditional, spiritual, scientific, medicinal and commercial prominence and importance of these resins. Rai also talks about mysticism connected with hemps such as Cannabis, Dhatura, and things like Cinnamon, Cloves, Bay Leaf, Saffron, Camphor, Brahmi, Gotu Kola.

One very interesting thing Rai reveals here. According to her, while many other countries have legalized the cultivation of Cannabis and other hemps which have huge demand and commercial benefits, India, where this plant has the sanction of

the Vedas and is closely connected with the worship of Lord Shiva, has strictly banned the cultivation and use of Cannabis in any form!

In the second Section, Rai says that our desires and dreams make our life and we always want to get what we expect and we can't brook any unexpected results of our actions. Rai tells us that when we surrender ourselves to God, we accept and enjoy surprises and agonies in life.

According to the author, our offerings to God is a sign of giving up of our egos and our surrender to God. There are plants, flowers, and fruits that we offer to God and that symbolically suggest our complete surrender to God. Rai talks about all such Divine things and hence the title Surrender

She begins this Section with a beautiful talk about the importance of Beetle Leaf and Miswak in many spiritual rituals and traditional practices. According to the Author, a paan (of beetle leaf) must be eaten in the morning after a bath and again after lunch. Further she says that the beetle leaf is the abode of Goddess Lakshmi, Lord Shiva and the moon. The stalk of this leaf is broken because it is believed to be the place of Yama.

The leaf is rich in Vitamins and antioxidants. Because of all these good elements in it, we give these leaves to our guests as a mark of honour and love. Here Rai also gives us lots of information about many other fruits, leaves, flowers, and food grains which have a sacred place in our religious rituals and a scientific role in our dietary practices.

In the last section titled SANCTIFY, Rai talks about the trees, plants, fruits, flowers, and leaves that we use in the belief that they would make us and our surroundings pure and

holy. In this process, Rai says, we bear some superstitions against some plants and trees and Rai feels that most of such ideas and beliefs are unfounded and unscientific.

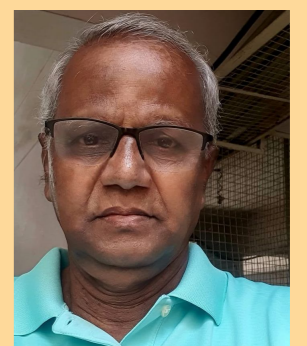
She begins this Section with a beautiful talk about two shrubs namely Rudraksha and Tulasi. According to Rai a lot of research has been going on for years to find out the health benefits of wearing different types of Rudraksha beads. Coming to Tulasi, Rai says that our age old beliefs about the many uses and benefits from Tulasi leaves and seeds have been scientifically proved.

Banyan, Peepal, Deodar, Tamarind, Neem, and Amla are useful to us in many ways and the Vedas, the epics, other holy and ancient texts vouch for the medicinal benefits of these Trees and shrubs, according to Rai.

The hundreds of reference books that the author has quoted here and listed at the end of this highly informative book speak volumes about the painstaking efforts Rai has put in for writing this book published in April 2025 by Penguin and priced at RS 399.

It is a must-read book both for sceptics and for those who have profound faith in the mysticism connected with all our trees and plants.

After the success of 'Mad Square', NarneNithin's 'Sri SriSriRajavaru' is a drama helmed by Satish Vegesna, known for his National Award-winning Shatamanambhavi. A missile scientist's day involves designing, testing and manufacturing systems, potentially including writing codes, analyzing data and debugging integrated systems. They are involved in preparing for launches, inspecting rocket engines and conducting experiments. In one word, they are the architects of a missile system. Yes, the proverb is a reminder that great things don't happen overnight. The adage highlights the importance of patience, persistence and consistent effort in achieving worthwhile goals. Whether you build a project, develop a skill, a relationship or even a personal goal it takes a good number of years, maybe ages. Dr. Prahlada Rama Rao, of 'Akash', 'Creator' and the drone 'Destroyer' fame, feels that it encourages individuals to be patient and persistent in their efforts, reminding them that success often comes because of gradual progress and continuous hard work. There are no shortcuts. The project 'Akash' took 15 long years. During that period the entire crew spent sleepless nights and missed their heart beats during the period. The precision in targeting the enemy drones is the classic feature of 'Akash'. The entire world is in awe of its power, while the enemy is yet to recover from coma. Dr Prahlada, as he is fondly addressed, felt that the relentless effort put in emphasizes the importance of appreciat-



ing the journey and the effort required to achieve something meaningful rather than just focusing on the outcome. Recalling his childhood days, he points out that he comes a humble family, which could not afford his higher education pursuits. Money can impact academic success, while excessive emphasis on it could overshadow other crucial factors like intrinsic motivation, hard work and the pursuit of knowledge for its own sake. According to him money is not the sole determinant of a student's achievement. After his engineering from Indian Institute of Sciences, Bangalore, in 1971 he joined Defense Research Development Laboratory (DRDL) as a young scientist, along with six more young engineering graduates, who called themselves FG-7 (friend's group of 7). They remain so till date. He earned a three-digit salary and could not dream of owning a bicycle or afford to travel by auto. RTC buses were

the only viable mode of transportation. Money was a scarce commodity. However, the spirit to prove themselves was very high and the entire group proved their mettle as scientists of exceptional merit. He says he is indebted to the extraordinary and humble 'Missile Man', Dr APJ Abdul Kalam, his mentor, friend, philosopher and guide. He embodies a unique blend of intellectual rigour and joyful spirit, making him a delightful companion and an invaluable asset to the country.
